Fair Booth exhibits are being planned by the committee.



GUEST SPEAKER: Dr. GEORGE SHAW, U of M GEOLOGY DEFARTMENT TITLE: "LEGISLATIVE ASSISTANT"

Prof. Shaw served as a consultant to U.S. Congressman Al Swift (Washington State), a member of the Energy and Commerce Committee. Prof. Shaw's consultations focused on geology and public policy dealing with nuclear waste disposal. In his talk with us Prof. Shaw will consider these issues from a national and also from a State of Minnesota point of view.

G.S.M. members will have several opportunities this summer to participate in a variety of field trips designed to increase our understanding of this year's lecture topics. Bob Gunville, field trip chairman, has arranged four trips with specialists in the areas being visited.

June 4-5 -- Glacial History of Southwestern Minnesota and the Minne-sota River Valley, Dr. Charles Matsch, Univ. of MN Duluth, 2 days by bus.

This picturesque rural portion of Minnesota has been shaped by a series of dramatic geologic events. Last summer we learned about how the extremely old bedrock was formed during the earth's early history. This year Dr. Matsch will take us, episode by episode, through the complex series of more recent glacial events which brought in the rich farm soils found on top of the bedrock. He is one of the principal researchers in this area, and will show us how he can determine its glacial history from the field evidence here. We will stay overnight (camping and motel) in Granite Falls, and will plan a pot-luck picnic supper in the park for Saturday evening, as we did last year.

June 3 -- SPECIAL SUENT -- Picnic and Autograph Party at Minnehaha Falls with Charlie Matsch, Co-Author of "Winnesota's Geology", 6:30 P.M. Charlie has agreed to get together with all his old -- and new --

friends for a special party at Minnehaha Falls on Friday evening before his field trip with us. All G.S.M. members and their families are invited to attend. If you wish, bring your book for autographing. will try to have extra books for sale. Bring your own food, beverages, dishes, and one item to share (your choice). Meet near the pavilion, by the G.S.M. banner.

June 25-26 -- Structures of an Ancient Syncline at Baraboo, Wisconsin --Dr. Peter Hudleston, Univ. of Minn. -- 2 days by Car. The Baraboo-Devil's Lake region of Wisconsin in noted for its

rugged wooded hills and beautiful scenery, a legacy from Precambrian crustal warping, as well as Pleistocene glaciation. The Baraboo Syncline is a classical study area for structural geologists. Dr. Hudleston tring is a classical study area for structural geologists. Dr. nuclesto, regularly conducts a field wip here to point out its many puzzles to his structural geology students. He will be able to show us some of the kinds of field relationships taught in his spring lecture series, and will point out how structural geologists use them to work out the solutions to these puzzles, sometimes from a single location such as Van Hise Rock at Rock Springs, Wisconsin. We will arrange camping or moteling in the lovely resort area of Devil's Lake State Park.

Mid to Late Summer (date to be arranged) -- Twin Cities Landforms, a Legacy of the Glaciers -- Barry Goldstein, Univ. of Minn., 1 day by car. The imprint of glaciers is found everywhere in the Twin Cities. Although the area's landforms are diverse, they have all been molded by ice. Barry Goldstein is a University of Minn. PhD candidate in glacial geology working under Dr. H.E. Wright, one of this year's G.S.M. lectur-ers. He will lead a local field trip to show us how glaciation has produced the topography here. Barry teaches a University Extension class on Minnesota Geology, and also leads his students on this trip.
