

FIELD TRIP

SUMMER FIELD TRIPS ARE SCHEDULED

Once again the field trips this summer will feature outstanding specialists as they lead us into new experiences as well as a lot of fun. Specialists, some new and some familiar to GSM members, will be interpreting the geology and environment of Glacier National Park, Montana; Pipestone, Minnesota; glacial landscapes of Southeastern Minnesota; and the mid-continent rift between Taylors Falls and Stillwater approximately.

1. Sloux Quartzite/Pipestone - June 21 & 22 (Saturday/Sunday)

Dave Southwick from the Minnesota Geological Survey will lead us on a two-day trip to southwestern Minnesota to investigate the Sloux quartzite and pipestone (catifinite) which crops out there. This is a very old (Precambrian) set of sediments that were later metamorphosed. For further information, contact Jeff Garry (297-0011)

2. Glacier National Park - July 19 - 23 (one week)

Bob Gunville, one of our GSM members who has visited Glacier National Park (and the adjacent Waterton Lakes National Park in Alberta) many times, will lead us on this trip where we look at rugged mountains and the forces which shaped them. For further information, call Bob at 574-1421.

3. Glacial Landscapes of Southeastern Minnesota - August 16 & 17 (Saturday/ Sunday)

Noward Hobbs from the Minnesota Geological Survey will lead us on this trip, where we will investigate the landforms and sediments created by continental glaciers which moved through most of Minnesota several times during the last two million years. 4. Mid-Continent Rift - Taylors Falls to Stillwater approximately - September 14 (Sunday)

Howard Mooers who conducts seminars for geologists, is a graduate student at the U of H and highly recommended by Peter Huttelstad of the Geological Survey, will lead the group. Observations will be made of the mid-continent rift, the basalts, the paleozoic and sedimentary rock formations. For more information, call Eva Selander (723-2130)

## HINTS FOR FIFLD TRIPPERS

Since our field trips are primarily for working rather than sight seeing, the following suggestions are offered:

- 1 / Clothing: Casual and practical, preferably layers that can be added or removed for maximum comfort; comfortable walking shoes or hours. Plastic maximum comfort.
- 2 / Equipment: Plastic bags, masking tape, pens, note book, geologists hammer.
- 3 / Food and drink: We always have lunch in the field. Bring drinking water as well as other beverage.
- 4 / Optional items: Camera, field glasses, hand lense, rain boots. Rock or fossil identification suides
- 5 / Overnight: In addition to usual items, plan for more meals in the field with canned or dry foods that do not need refrigeration.
- 6 / Flan to spend the whole day; schedules tend to be flexible. We will return when we arrive,
- Note: Minnesota Geological Survey has some booklets on mineral and fossil collecting.
